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disclosure from these companies and these projects. It exists today. I don't think that the floor amendment that's before us will actually enhance that. Now, the issue is not disclosure. The issue is use. Right now, we can't use the data that the Department of Revenue has. If we could plug it into the Legislative Fiscal Office computer model, we would be using actual numbers. We would be using better data. Now, why is that good? It's the same reason that I gave the Government Committee for why we wanted to be able to incorporate the use of the accountants and the auditing office of the state when we did performance audits. Because the better product is when you use actual numbers. It's not about analysis. It's about plugging in actual numbers. We can get a better product in the Fiscal Office in the computer model if we use numbers. I am convinced that those numbers will prove beyond a shadow of a doubt just exactly how powerful LB 775 has been for this state and its economic growth. Now, there are some assumptions that have been used because they didn't have numbers. And those assumptions could be clarified. And when you look at percentages, I agree with Senator Brown, there has been a tendency to use a 70-30. I don't agree with that number. But it's very simple. When you use mathematical models, you just change the number, and you say, well, you could figure this same data, these same numbers, figure it on 60-40, figure it on 50-50, figure it on 40-60, figure it on 30-70. Those are things you can do with mathematical models very easily. But you have to start out with the numbers initially. Now, do we have a comfort level with letting our Legislative Fiscal Office have this data? Well, I do. Because in fact I think we can trust our state employees. Are we concerned about them giving this data to the public? Well, certainly not. Because in the AM1205 amendment that you have from the Revenue Committee, it's a Class IV felony. You know what the punishment is for that? Up to five years in jail, and a \$10,000 fine, or both. Now, how many of our employees do you think are going to give that data away carelessly with that kind of a penalty? I don't think it's going to happen. And it would certainly be something that would be careless if they did it, because in fact we often have our employees who switch from one place to another. We had a business analyst in the committee, Revenue Committee office, who has now...
