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SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR LANDIS: But that's something that TRAIN told us that we couldn't get anyplace else.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Bromm. Senator Brashear on your amendment.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Mr. President, members of the body, you listen carefully, you know, I think we just...I think a point just got made for me. The TRAIN model says that meat packing fails Nebraska...or, if it doesn't fail, there are 23 other things we could do more of. Well, you know what? Yes. We could have only Berkshire Hathaway companies, if we could get them. Sometimes you have to play the hand that's dealt you. I can't or won't discuss that now, because the next division is about meat packing. But I think we'll have an opportunity to examine whether the TRAIN model tells us anything we want to know about meat packing. But that's my point. I would ask you again...we're on General File. We're debating the committee amendment and my attempted floor amendment to it. The committee has spoken at length, and carefully and knowledgeably about why they want what they want. And this floor amendment is a chance to suggest respectfully, within the process and the procedure, to the Revenue Committee, no, this is not where we're going. We are not going to give you any and all information required of LB 775 applicants, except that prohibited by federal law. That's a pretty broad mandate. And they haven't told you even why they need it all. If we were going to require any data to come across from the executive branch to the legislative branch for the purposes of doing policy analyses, we ought to specify what that information is. And until we do, let's don't let it flow. That's one. Two, we have not been told how you can do county by county and project by project analyses and still prevent the reverse engineering and all of the evils denoted by that phrase as we've used it in this debate. And there are no prohibitions against the disclosure of project by project and county by county analysis as a part of public policy. We are creating a conundrum. We tell the Legislative Fiscal Office,
