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matter, there is of course the question of confidentiality. But if you give full weight to the question of confidentiality, you will do so to great detriment to the integrity of government. Because one of the primary purposes of government and of this Legislature is to see that the executive branch in all its departments is following through in accordance with the laws that we make. And if you think that all the time they do follow through, I think only the freshmen would be thinking that at this point in time, maybe. But just to give you an example, the other day, the Department of Health and Human Services, we discovered that in three different areas they weren't following the law, and it's been costing us, arguably, in the six figures...seven figures, several millions of dollars. And so that performance audit function is extremely important, to us, I would hope, and to the people of the state. What this amendment would do would be to say that the section precluding the giving over of information would not prohibit the disclosure to the Program Evaluation Committee or its staff of any information records otherwise confidential requested by the committee in conjunction with a program evaluation authorized pursuant to the legislative statutes. What does that mean? First of all, the information would only go to the committee or its staff if it's authorized a performance audit. It would not go to anybody else. They would continue to be under the Class IV felony provision that is the incentive not to reveal information in this area. Should be highly effective. It doesn't mean that the Program Evaluation Committee or any one member can just go ask for that information. It has to be pursuant to a specific authorization to do a performance audit in this area for a particular purpose. Now, this...remember that this Program Evaluation Committee consists of, or will consist of as soon as the other bill goes forward which you've advanced now to Select File, will consist of the Speaker of the Legislature, the Chair of the Appropriations Committee, the Chair of the Exec Board, and four other members. These are the people that you've chosen in your leadership positions, not people likely to authorize a performance audit for anything other than the best of reasons. And also, a performance audit has to be authorized...unlike an interim study, has to be authorized by a majority of the committee. So it couldn't be just those three people; it would have to be four of the seven. So that's the whole point of this
