But back in the days when this was implemented, Governor Orr come to Kearney, Nebraska. I was the chairman of the county board then. She sat down with four or five of us and told us about LB 775. And I remember she put emphasis on one thing and that was to qualify. You have to qualify in order to receive these benefits. You have to qualify. That was one of the main things, so that's what we determine in here, whether you qualify or not. And I remember there was other things spoken about it, and I forget what all of them all were at the point, but I remember you had to qualify. And the key word was then that you have to entice companies, and this should make us more dollars down the road, especially dollars are the thing we're looking after here, along with jobs and along with a better way of life for Nebraskans. But the bottom line here, most of us when you think of LB 775, it's money. It's money--how much are we gaining; how much are we losing? But little communities such as Gothenburg, I'll just name one, I won't name the rest of them, but look what it's done for them. Look what it's done. They've got businesses in there. They just worked at it. You have to work at it, and this is one of our tools to work at it here. I could go on and on and on, on the whole issue, but all these amendments,...
