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more talked about. Maybe LB 806, the education bill, that was talked about, but that's kind of gone away. This one hasn't gone away. This is hanging in there, LB 775. Some numbers catch on. LB 775 caught on, and why shouldn't it, you know? It could be our future. LB 775 could be our future. Our kids will be the judge of that, our "grandkids." Won't be my kids. I don't have any, unfortunately, but it will your kids, your "grandkids" will be deciding what my grandparents or whatever did in the Legislature. So do the right thing. Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Cudaback. Senator Landis.

SENATOR LANDIS: Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature, I am indifferent to the outcome of this amendment in that it's not what the committee talked about. We didn't have a public hearing on it. It's not the direction of the committee's thinking. It's not that it's not an idea worth thinking about and reflecting on. It's just not part of what we've been working on up until now. Does the Legislature get to do whatever it wants to do? Absolutely. I'm going to be not voting, at best, on this. It's not that it's wrong or a bad idea. It's just that it's...I'm being asked to make a decision upon which I have little information and little time for reflection, and I'm not prepared at this moment to make that position. I don't know whether or not Senator Brashear and I happen to be on the same side of the coin on this one. We actually might be. So just to pique my curiosity, I'd like to give the remainder of my time to Senator Brashear to find out whether or not we actually might be on the same side of an issue or not.
