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with respect to economic competition among the states. Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Beutler. Senator Landis. Senator Landis waives. Senator Combs.

SENATOR COMBS: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, members of the body. I very much believe in this bill, LB 608. I just wanted to make a comment as to our reference to this act as an Investment and Growth Act, which it has and we don't argue that, and there's been some very good debate here on the issue that it has provided growth in the investment that we have placed in business through out faith in how they utilize the tax dollars that we excuse them from paying. I want to also make the point that none of us makes investments without expecting a prospectus. The SEC requires that any entity that is invested in issue a prospectus annually to all its investors. I believe what we're asking for here is very similar to that. And I'm not smart enough to know all the ins and outs of how it's done. I'm a very outcome oriented person. I think we can get real hung up on process. I know the outcome I want to see and I know the outcome that the people of Nebraska expect to come out of this Legislature this year where it comes to the utilization of these tax dollars. So I'm not here to argue about the process. I'll leave that to the wise old heads that's been here many more years than I have and know the impact of actions taken on the floor much better than I do as far as the "micromanaging" and the minutia that Senator Brashear referred to. However, I do want to make a point that I feel we do owe an accountability. If we think in terms of the prospectus idea, that's exactly what we're giving back to the people of Nebraska, just as we do when they invest in other kinds of investments that are controlled by the SEC. And I would give the rest of my time to Senator Landis, if he would like it, to address to this.

SPEAKER BROMM: You yielded your time to Senator Landis? He waives that time. Thank you, Senator Combs. Senator Cunningham.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: Thank you, Mr. Speaker and members. I wonder if I might have a dialogue with Senator Beutler for a
