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slaughterhouse, I think it's covered by the slaughterhouse. In other words, you couldn't get a LB 775 for the front room administration office of the slaughterhouse. However, if there is this division which is a slaughterhouse, and this division which is not, I think this division over here, which if it's a stand-alone operation or is different, still could probably make use of LB 775 credits. That's our intention. And there is some language that I confess is somewhat unclear about where we are on that. But the intention is this: it's the slaughterhouse operation that you have demonstrably a group of employees which are vulnerable and which are in a number of cases, although not uniformly, exploited. And that's what we were concerned about. Those operations also wind up being the toxic ones. They wind up being the ones that create the environmental problems. It's not the boxing meat operations that are creating emissions that are creating health-provable health risks for Nebraska citizens. It's the slaughterhouse operations.

SENATOR SMITH: Okay. Thank you, Senator Landis. I must rise in opposition to the division of the committee amendment, because I believe that it...it doesn't get to the root of the problem. I mean, the problem might be some immigration issues, the problem might be some environmental issues. And I think that the Bromm amendment to the division certainly helps, and that's why I want to support that. But I think we need to look at the bigger picture of value-added agriculture in Nebraska, and these industries that complement the farmers and the ranchers across Nebraska, whether it's killing the beef cattle on the floor there, or whether it's feeding the cattle at feedlots prior to the slaughterhouse, so to speak. And I think we need to keep that big picture in mind, and get to the root of the problem, those problems that may exist with the immigration and otherwise. And there might be other industries, rather than just meatpacking, that have some of the same issues,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR SMITH: ...and we need to address those as well. I'll never forget when I was traveling overseas and I saw workers with a pick and an ax and a hand shovel digging trench to bury optical fiber. And that was part of the government's plan for
