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SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Bromm, you have about a minute and a half this time.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you very much, Senator Bourne. Senator Bourne, you have very accurately pointed out some things. And I woke up this morning thinking about whether or not I had instructed Bill Drafting to strike that language clearly, and apparently I didn't. So I have had the amendment redrafted, and I've got it on the Clerk's desk with that language, and when I have an opportunity I'm going to ask to substitute the amendment that's been redrawn, which would then include that language. The point...and I was going to respond to Senator Landis as well. He alluded, I think, in his comments to the immigration concerns, the...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SPEAKER BROMM: ...not concerns about immigration, but concerns about illegal immigration, about violating our immigration laws. And that is something that I had made a note that I think at some point should be added with the proper language. That would be my suggestion. Another concern Senator Landis had was, how do you tell when there's a violation or not. And that's something we need to work with. I can tell you that if somebody does something like Senator Landis was describing, and they wind up paying a fine but not admitting guilt, to me, if it's a violation of environmental law, labor laws, and it causes damage, then it ought to come under this act, it ought to come under this sanction. And certainly I think we can deal with that concern. On the other hand, if it's just an allegation that someone makes but it's not proven,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SPEAKER BROMM: ...then it shouldn't be considered as a violation. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Bourne and Senator Bromm. Mr. Clerk, item on the desk.
