the whole area of southwest Nebraska down there. It's a market for cattle; all the jobs that spin off of this, whether it's trucking or...Senator Bourne pointed out, we have a tremendous market for distillers grain, for the potential ethanol plant there in Lexington, and one in Trenton, and so on. I think we've got to be careful what we're doing here. This has been a major part of the economy of Nebraska for its entire history, is cattle and livestock. And I just hate to penalize these people, that are out there trying to do what's right, with another set of stipulations we put on them. If you have a DEQ problem, you're going to get fined through the DEQ, as pointed out by another speaker. And why pile on them twice? So I'm wrestling with trying to decide whether I want to support the Bromm amendment and make this section of the division a little bit better, or whether to just get rid of the whole thing, which, as I go back to my opening here on this debate, if we reject this part of the divided question, FA1206, it's simply going to put us back where we were with meatpacking. And the debate in the committee on exempting casinos was, we're going to put it in there to be very careful. But I don't think casinos are going to qualify for LB 775 anyway. So I think maybe what I'd recommend people doing, if you're in favor of leaving meatpacking subject to being...use LB 775 credits, just get rid of this whole division, this FA1206, I guess, is what's up there. And simply vote the whole thing down, and it remains the way it is now. So I think we've got to be very careful what we're doing here. And I also represent part of Dawson County, obviously, and the immigrant population out there has assimilated themselves into the society. And granted, there were some changes, and things had to be done, and so on. But I look back at my family history. We haven't been in the United States all that long myself, my family. So I have no problem with that. The people directly involved, the school board members in Lexington, I know, the mayor called, and so on, saying, hey, be careful what you're doing here, and what...pay attention. This is something that's very critical to southwest Nebraska. And my own thoughts are to probably just vote this entire division of the question down and let things remain as they are.
