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Legislature, you know I do have just one problem with the discussion today, and it's been a very, very good discussion, and that's that we...they're using that term "slaughterhouses." That went out a long time ago in Omaha, Nebraska, back in, a matter of fact, the fifties when we started using the term packinghouses, and then later on processors. And if we're not going to call gambling gambling and we're going to call it gaming, let's not call packinghouses slaughterhouses. Let's call it processing. To me that makes a little more sense. Now when Senator Bromm introduced this amendment, I thought immediately, you know, that's why that guy is Speaker of this body because it makes sense, and I support that. And I hope that we can come up with some language that will somehow allow this to happen because I think it is important. We have to be so careful about what we do in this body, though. You know I was visiting with Senator Erdman a minute ago and he said if there were two cattle producers that got together and said, you know, if we would work out a plan between us, and if we could start taking the value-added agriculture a little further, and if we would start maybe our own little operation, and we would take our cattle and we would process them ourselves, and if we would package them, they can't do that. Why? Well, because now you're both a producer and a processor and we have Initiative 300, we've got LB 835 that kind of said, no, you can't go there anymore. And so I always get concerned any time we start putting limitations on what individuals can't do, can and can't do. I do support Senator Bromm's motion here, his amendment. I think it is a way to look at this very important issue, that we do need processors in this state. We need to, if we're going to grow seed, if we're going to have corn, if we're going to have soybeans, if we're going to have cattle, if we're going to have hogs, we need to process those. And I do believe that anything that goes out of the state should be in a box. Certainly, it's going to bring higher prices for the corn, for the cattle, for the hogs, and also bring a better value, I think, to the end, which is the consumer, which hasn't even been mentioned here today. So I hope that we can, if that's what we need to do, work on the language in Senator Bromm's bill, that we can take care of those bad actors, for those who seem to always, anytime we do have rules, regulations, they stretch those. We have that. It doesn't make any difference whether it
