know, I was worth more than I got paid, but I got paid a fair amount of dollars. I didn't have to drive my car. I could have an old wreck of a car, walk to work, did all these things, walked home for lunch, didn't have to buy a \$5 lunch, did all these things in my rural 200 place. A lot of cases like this here. So the point is blanket policy, I hated blank...I hate blanket policies. I hate them. We've...I've always talked against them, so I don't know if you can make a blanket policy like this here--better wages for North Platte, better wages for Scottsbluff, better wages for Lexington, poor wages for...it may cost you more to work in Scottsbluff or may less. I just don't think you can have a blanket policy. Rural areas are great areas. They compensate in other areas. Maybe should be paid less. Should you? I don't know, but I kind of doubt it. I really kind of doubt it. Like Senator Chambers said, you know, are you worth less in Riverdale than you're worth in Omaha? I don't think so. I think I'm just as good as any...I better not say that. I might get in trouble here. But anyhow, I...just the point is blanket policies are not a good idea. If there's no other way, fine. Then I heard some other talk here on Lexington how...in the meat packing deal and all this stuff here. (Laugh) I mean I've toured it. Senator Janssen kind of said it. Why, what's wrong with the meat packing? What's wrong with working there? Is that a smaller job than some other jobs? Is it belittling yourself to work in? I think not. It's a job. They're paid well. They're compensated well. They do a good job there. Has Lexington changed? Lexington, some people think Lexington is, wow, who'd want to go there? Who'd want to walk those streets? Who? Well, that's a terrible city. Show me. I'm there once, three times a week. It's a city just like...I'd just...I'd just as soon walk the streets of Lexington I would some parts of Lincoln, tell you the truth. I'm being kind of blunt here, but there's no difference. Lexington is a good city. Slaughterhouse, sure, what do you want to call it? I don't know what term you want to use but let's just don't say, oh, they have a slaughterhouse, they must be a bad city. Oh, they have people that haven't lived there in the last five years. They moved in from the south or whatever, and that must be bad. You can't trust them. That's a bunch of hogwash. Let's don't treat blanket policies. We can't blanket things here. There's issues all...I better sit down. I'm getting too
