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in Nebraska particularly. It's where we can get the best price and that's how we remain competitive. That's a bit of why we...I see rural Nebraska going down. We have people out there willing to work for \$7 and \$8 an hour, no question about it. It's just the jobs aren't there. So if we're going to maintain an artificially high minimum wage here, we can show by experience they're not going to come. We have too high a base or floor here. We had that. We've eliminated the rural economic opportunities act, whatever the correct words were there, but it didn't work, and here we are right back trying to do it again and it's not going to work the second time. I think there's some people on the floor here that ought to have a business, ought to have 30 employees, go out there, meet a payroll, fill out the workmen's comp forms, the insurance that's gone up, go through a federal labor audit. These are things that we go...have gone through in our business. Go through a federal labor audit. There's nobody lifting hundred-pound anything out there. We have restrictions on who we can hire as school kids and how many hours they can work during the week and so on, and whether it's school hour...or whether it's schools or summertime. Go through a federal labor audit. We did. I've been there and done that. There's nobody that lifts over 40 pounds in these stores. Nobody out there forcing these kids to work. We offer them what we think is a fair wage. They come to work for us and we have very little absenteeism. There's no slave labor camps out there. Ought to go have to meet your loan payments. Go out there and do some of these things. Go hire your 20-30 employees, start a business, and then see if you have a different perspective on some of these requirements and whatnot we're trying to put into place here. My problem now with this is we...and Senator Landis has addressed it somewhat, we have an unworkable section in this particular division of the question here with insurance. We talked about it in committee. It's not going to work. We're going to cause more problems here than we ever dreamed possible. And as far as the wage part of this particular division, we've been there and done that with high wages. You can't force people to put businesses in rural Nebraska if the wages are too high. Why do they want to do that? They didn't. There wasn't one single business use the program we had in place that we've now eliminated. So this has been an interesting discussion, but there's so many other
