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in my opinion. I don't like to see a line drawn in the sand of which side of the fence you're in, the rural and the urban. I would hope that we would have cooperation amongst all the senators in making decisions. The thing about the discussion with the amount of dollars, the amount of wages having to be paid to get the work done, I think it comes down to these companies or slaughter plants or whatever it is that are getting some of these LB 775 tax credits. Those businesses are profit centers. What happens is whatever it takes to get the workers to do the job, they will have to pay that. The only way that they're going to be a profit center is either charge more for their product or pay less for the raw material that they're getting. And being a senator, a livestock feeder, it generally comes off of my paycheck, because whenever they have to pay more for wages or get less for their products it comes down to they pay less for my livestock and that's where it comes to. I have not got all my thoughts together on this amendment yet, but I will be thinking about it. Thank you.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Senator. Senator Chambers, you are next.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Madam President, members of the Legislature, I'd like to ask Senator Landis a question about this amendment.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Senator Landis,...
