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to come in and provide those jobs to our people. Thank you very much.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Senator. Senator Chambers, your light is next.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Madam President, members of the Legislature, Oscar Wilde wrote about a lot of things, and he talked about outside agitators. He said they are hated because you may have an employer who has workers who are very contented because they've been persuaded that they're not worth anything, and these outside agitators come in and stir up things by telling them, no, you're worthy of something better than this. The workers begin to listen. They develop a higher sense of self-worth and they begin to make demands, and this is why labor agitators are run out of town or killed. To say that people are happy because they're accepting the only thing that's there is totally wrong, and for some people on this floor to give that impression is totally wrong. I'm going to talk more and more about slavery. See, not one of you on this floor can say you had relatives in this country who would have their lips raised so that the person who was going to buy them would look at their teeth just like they were the teeth of a horse, who could feel the genitals to see if you are going to be a good breeder as a human being. This is what white people don't want to talk about, but it's the very thing that's always in my mind, and especially when I listen to the conversations we're having here and we're valuing people as less than what they're worth because the exploiters want it that way. That's what it is. Not one person on this floor would want to live at a wage like this. And remember, the taxpayers are being asked to subsidize the cowardice and insensitivity of this Legislature. The taxpayers are the ones giving these breaks. When the big shots don't pay taxes, who does? How can there be pride about what is being done here this morning? Eight dollars and twenty-five cents, Senator Stuhr believes that the people she represents are worth less than the people in the urban areas. Senator Redfield thinks they're worth less. I don't know how Senator Synowiecki is going to vote. Senator Thompson has tried to argue logically as to why this should not be done but, reluctantly, she is going to vote for it. Do you see how the business people whip this
