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about now. And that is in these small counties, the level is too high. You cannot...you could start a company out with a lesser amount of money and perhaps, and in some cases it has happened where the company has grown to the point where it employed a lot more people, but at the outset to demand \$3 million and create that many jobs, sometimes it's kind of a stretch. So I'd like to support, I was going to prepare an amendment myself, but if Senator Bromm already has one, I'd like to work with him because I think we need to address the issue of the small counties, the small, less populated areas of the state where investing that much money is a difficult task for a business that's just starting out. And I think most of us recognize that, particularly in the rural populated areas of the state. So even though I will support what's before us now because I think it's the right thing to do, I would like to see some amendments brought up when we get a little further along and address the issue in the manner that Senator Bromm has talked about, and perhaps bring some of these small...these jobs to the small areas of the state that we've been unsuccessful to do up to this point. You know, if we're willing to put money up for some of the real large companies to the extent that we are, then we ought to be willing to put up a smaller amount for some of the smaller parts of the state and, perhaps, bring some employment in some of the areas of the state they're having a very difficult time at this time. So I just wanted to rise to give my support to what I think is the proper thing to do. And if Senator Bromm doesn't bring an amendment, I will. With that, thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Vrtiska. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I don't have an adding machine but calculating, as Senator Raikes might do, but he's not here right now, if in these rural counties that we're talking about a person were paid \$8.25 an hour, because they ain't worth much, they'd get \$17,160, if they got that much for 52 weeks out of the year, \$17,160. If you paid 20 people that much, you'd be paying \$343,200 in wages; \$343,200 in wages. I'd like to ask Senator Landis a question on the amendment.
