SENATOR CHAMBERS: Which is the more lucrative aspect of the business?

SENATOR STUTHMAN: I do not know which one would be the most lucrative. I think there's a lot of individuals out there that want to supplement their income, and they are putting up facilities on their place, not owning the livestock but doing the day-to-day chores and they can accumulate...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR STUTHMAN: ...an income of about \$24,000 on raising these pigs.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But this is not their own? They are doing this in conjunction with and for somebody else who is already in the business making the money, isn't that true?

SENATOR STUTHMAN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So I'm, in a sense, just selling my labor.

SENATOR STUTHMAN: Yes, that's very true.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So if I was going to start an operation and own it myself, I'm going to raise the animals, own the facility, would it be a wise thing for me to do in terms of entering hog growing or production at that level?

SENATOR STUTHMAN: I think the amount of investment that you, as an individual, would have to put into it and the amount of labor that you could afford as one individual, it would not be very wise...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay.

SENATOR STUTHMAN: ...to enter the business.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So farming is out, cattle production is out, hog production is out, what other little business is there that I can open in a rural community and hire 10 people and be
