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hate to see a provision that is valuable wind up in a piece of unconstitutional legislation. If somebody didn't like anything in this bill, a challenge could be made. Until a challenge is made, an act by the Legislature is presumed to be constitutional. And it takes a supermajority of the Nebraska Supreme Court to strike down a legislative act. Instead of four of the seven judges, it would take five of the seven. But when you have a bill which clearly is unconstitutional, you sometimes get an unanimous seven vote majority striking down a bill. I doubt that anybody who feels however strongly about one or all of these different subjects could honestly say that when combined in one bill that bill contains one subject. It does not. And there have been numerous Nebraska cases handed down by the Nebraska Supreme Court, and the Supreme Courts in other states, explaining why a bill should contain only one subject. The main reason in Nebraska is that the constitution says so. This is not like Congress where anything you can get attached can attach and ride along. Some of these things are not just cleanup, and some of them are valuable. I especially like Senator Synowiecki's amendment. If you go ahead and attach all of these provisions and advance the bill, if nobody else would ask, I would ask for the Attorney General's Opinion for this reason.

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: We could find out early enough that it's likely the bill is unconstitutional, then we could salvage what we thought ought to be given the opportunity to make it across the board in a form that is constitutional. But I'm not going to oppose or object to you suspending the rules or whatever other course you choose to take. And, in fact, if you suspend the rules, there is some questions I want to ask about LB 821 (sic-AM0821), not to delay but for clarification. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Jensen, if I could just ask a couple of questions.
