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SENATOR JANSSEN:    Yes.

SENATOR JENSEN:    I'm not 100 percent sure. Certainly, if there is a licensed pharmacist, that licensed pharmacist has to comply with the regulations.

SENATOR JANSSEN:    In the state that they are shipping those pharmaceuticals into, is that correct?

SENATOR JENSEN:    That's my understanding.

SENATOR JANSSEN:    Okay, thank you, Senator Jensen.

SENATOR JENSEN:    I'll find out on that if I'm wrong but that's my understanding.

SENATOR JANSSEN:    And I know we're going to see more and more of this as pharmaceuticals, the cost of them keeps rising and rising. You know, in some cases by the time someone on Social Security pays their pharmaceutical bill at the end of the month, they don't have very much left. And thank goodness for the pharmaceuticals because it is keeping a lot of people alive. On the other hand, I don't want to see us go down that path that where you can hire two or three or four people off the street and say, all right, you're going to be my technician now. You do exactly as I say. And we have something happen that's not good, and I want to be very protective of that, so I'm going to listen to the discussion and I hope that...I hope it doesn't come to that in order to save a lot of dollars. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

SENATOR CUDABACK:    Thank you, Senator Janssen. Senator Bourne, followed by Senator Chambers.

SENATOR BOURNE:    Thank you, Senator Cudaback, members. It's been a long day. I think Senator Chambers is getting a little tired because he's not able to comprehend what he's reading there.
