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that...I kind of see this bill as a working document at this point, and I think Senator Brashear will be willing to work with us on the concerns that we have with these provisions of the bill.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, if I'm willing to cut a little slack at this point, because everybody, I believe, is working in good faith, and I think you probably are persuaded that I have some of the same concerns that you have, at this point would you consider withdrawing your amendment, and we all work on this to make sure that we don't put a lot of unnecessary material into the statute, while still trying to arrive at the ultimate goal of the bill?

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Yes. Yes, I...you know, Senator Chambers, I think you understand, I did make a commitment to offer this amendment on General File.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: And that is part of the reason why it was done in this fashion and this time manner. I would be interested to see if any members have any additional comment at this stage. And then after the comment was received, I will withdraw the amendment and work with you and Senator Brashear.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Synowiecki. Members of the Legislature, maybe you can see that this bill is unique in other ways from those maybe mentioned by Senator Brashear, in how it came into being. People who have very strong views on some aspects of the bill are showing a willingness to allow an opportunity to see if we can come together and reach an accord. I usually will not give ground when I feel as strongly about something as I do some of the parts of this bill. But in many cases, I'm not dealing with an introducer or sponsor who is as willing to listen and work to try to arrive at an accord. I especially appreciate the fact that a youngster like Senator Synowiecki, who can be referred to, relatively speaking, as a young cub, is willing to adopt an attitude which is lenient, being manifested by the oldest bear on the floor of the Legislature. So when you have youth and age...not euthanasia,
