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offenses that are defined under the definition of violent offense.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Yes, sir.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. Thank you very much. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Beutler. I see no further lights. Senator Synowiecki, you're recognized to close on your amendment.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Thank you, Senator Bromm. Again, getting back to administrative sanctions, I do think that the current system is...this is kind of reinventing the wheel type of approach that we have here under the committee amendments to LB 46. I'm very much looking forward to working with Senator Brashear, Senator Chambers, so we can arrive at some agreement with regard to the administrative sanctions provisions within the bill. And again, on behalf of the line officers of the state of Nebraska, that's why I brought the amendment. And I will continue to advocate for their perspective. And we can arrive at an agreement with regard to these provisions. With that, I'll withdraw the amendment. Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: The amendment is withdrawn. Thank you, Senator Synowiecki. Back on the committee amendments. Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Brashear, my last question for the day, if you would. And I'm talking about Section 43 of the bill, where there's an annual report on committed offenders. It says, the report shall summarize each such former committed offender's behavior since parole, and generally evaluate his or her success or lack of success in becoming a law-abiding member of society. (Cough) Choked me up to think of them becoming law-abiding members of society. (Laughter) This is an annual report on all of these offenders who have been released in accordance with an emergency act. And I guess my question is, it's not clear to me how long you go on reporting on each one of these individuals. I mean, is this kind of cumulative and it goes on for as long as they live? Or you follow them for so
