SENATOR QUANDAHL: That is correct.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: How long will it be held in that fund?

SENATOR QUANDAHL: It would be held in that fund, and I'd have to go back and look at the abandoned property, but the State Treasurer does have to go through procedures to try to identify the owners or the recipients of the property that is turned over to the State Treasurer.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: For how long a period of time, is what I want to know, will it remain in that discrete fund?

SENATOR QUANDAHL: In this particular...in Section 4, it's turned over to that but it does leave it...it is somewhat open as we could actually probably come back later on and determine different time limits.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, it sounds to me like you're not quite familiar with all the ramifications of the bill, so let me ask some more questions and help both of us. What is the least amount of time it can remain in that fund under the law, this money that your amendment deals with? What is the least amount of time?

SENATOR QUANDAHL: I suppose it could go just right in and right out if...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: You suppose, or you know?

SENATOR QUANDAHL: I do know it could go right out if...if, when it's paid into there, that the State Treasurer has knowledge of the Nebraska resident to whom that money or that stock should go.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: If a person is not found, how long will it remain there before the money can go into the state General Fund? Let me ask it a different way. How long must the Treasurer seek to find the owner, under the law?
