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SENATOR QUANDAHL: ...to respond to?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: If you can.

SENATOR QUANDAHL: Yeah, well, I mean I'll try to answer that the best I can, is because of these demutualizations. I went through the amount of money that went into the Unclaimed Property Fund. This is a bubble or a fairly significant amount of money that looks like it will be paid into the State Treasurer's Unclaimed Property Fund eventually.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But why does it have to go in two years instead of five?

SENATOR QUANDAHL: My friend Gene Tyson is trying to help me out saying interest.

SENATOR CUDABACK: I'm sorry, your time is up, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR QUANDAHL: Yeah, there is some benefit to get...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I didn't hear you, Mr. President?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Your time is up, Senator. I'm sorry.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Aguilar, you did not wish to speak to this. Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Cudaback, members of the Legislature, Senator Quandahl, I'm trying to understand this too. I think maybe this is a good thing, but I'm concerned about whether claimants will have the same rights. But if, in fact, we're talking about \$10 million, I assume if the demutualization company held this...or these companies held this \$10 million for five years, the state of Nebraska would get no interest off that. Is that correct?

SENATOR QUANDAHL: I believe that would be correct, yes.
