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change if the state was just going to get the money in five years instead of two years. I'm toying with the idea, and I believe I do have an amendment that I could substitute in there that would give us the discretion to, after that money is paid into the trust account, it would give the Appropriations Committee the discretion to pay that money out to either the public school fund of the state of Nebraska or the General Fund, as we deem necessary. If that is an amendment that the body would find I guess more palatable than the kind of boxed canyon or going up and holding these funds in perpetuity, that would be something that I certainly would consider and I would...I guess I would welcome anybody that feels compelled to talk on this to get up...

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR QUANDAHL: ...and give me their thoughts on that. But with that, I've tried to explain some of the reasons behind this and, again, if I could just reiterate, it's closing down a five-year period presumption of abandonment down to two years, and it's just with a very specific case, and that's insurance companies that have gone through a reorganization or a demutualization, and that's what this amendment attempts to codify. Thank you very much.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you very much, Senator. (Visitors introduced.) Senator Brown.

SENATOR BROWN: Mr. President, I would yield my time to Senator Chambers, if he has some questions that he'd like to pose.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, I don't have any...you mean I can pose them to Senator Quandahl or to whomever I choose?

SENATOR BROWN: I think Senator Quandahl is off the floor, but, yeah.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh, then, no, I won't take your time then and just talk.
