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particularly the Appropriations Committee, the authority at its discretion to make transfers from that fund, and I would hope that that would address some of the questions that Senator Chambers may have had about the uncertainty of keeping those money in trust forever. I think it sharpens the amendment somewhat in that it makes it at the discretion of the Appropriations Committee at the Legislature that those transfers can be made. And so, in short, this AM1022 is the same amendment as before, however, it does allow...it does have the additional line that does allow the Appropriations Committee to make transfers out of that account. Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Quandahl. (Visitors introduced.) Senator Cudaback.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Mr. Speaker and members, some of us are a little slower in catching on than others, and so I'm one of those slow ones, so I want to...could I ask Senator Quandahl a question, please?

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Quandahl, would you yield?

SENATOR QUANDAHL: Yes, I would.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Quandahl, you know, we always think it's always me first and we can't get past that point. It's always me, so I'm wondering what's going to happen to me. And being as I'm never going to move from Riverdale, I'll pick on somebody else. Let's say Speaker Bromm. Let's say Speaker Bromm lives in Wahoo and he has made a thousand dollar overpayment and he didn't cash his check. In the meantime, he moved to Timbuktu. He moved, right? Now, that check that he lost comes to the unclaimed property over here. With what we're doing here, what we're doing with your amendment, will that affect what he could get down the road? Does it have anything to do with what he might receive?

SENATOR QUANDAHL: No.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Nothing.
