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SENATOR STUHR: ...it's an interesting concept. But I do oppose the amendment. Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Stuhr. Senator Brown.

SENATOR BROWN: Mr. President, members, I...in my opening I talked about all the states who have in some form or fashion implemented the use of this technology. And we're talking about 15 states that I'm aware of, and several federal departments. It is used on...by many national companies to do a multitude of different kinds of applications. And I think that that's one of the important aspects about this. It can be customized to the needs of each and every agency that is going to be receiving the information. Under the amendment, we are talking about a demonstration project. And there are a couple groups that are willing to look at being a part of the demonstration. The University of Nebraska is one. Currently, the university is paying to have a lockbox system for some of their tickets and some other applications. They are paying a bank to do this, and it's a fairly significant amount that they're paying. And so this is an opportunity for them to have that service at, at least for the demonstration period, no cost to the agency. By showing that this information can be processed automatically, all the information transferred to the agencies automatically, we're going to have information at the end of this demonstration project that will help us know that this is a good investment. But the other piece of it, and probably the piece that I think is the most critical, is that the agencies, during the demonstration year, will be working with the Treasurer's Office to develop a plan so that we can see what...how it might work for each and every agency. One of my great frustrations is that none of the agencies who we worked with to try to get input in developing the original legislation...which obviously was a little too far-reaching for anyone's comfort level, and that's why we moved it back to a demonstration project...none of the agencies went to see the centralized collection of child support, none of them found out about the technology that allows for the automatic transfer, with the exception of the University of Nebraska, which really...who really did attempt to find out a lot about it. They had some experience from having contracted out with the bank they're doing it with. And so I believe,
