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SENATOR BEUTLER: All right. And with respect to those who choose to participate in the demonstration project, if it were Department of Motor Vehicles, for example, and Senator Stuhr, interestingly, outlined a number of types of deposits that they would have. Would they continue to run a parallel system as you did this?

SENATOR BROWN: Well, it...probably it would depend on...I doubt that for the demonstration all of those applications would be done. So you would determine what would be the lowest hanging fruit. And maybe it would be an area that they already are doing a lot of e-commerce in, so that they're used to processing by computer the...whatever that is. And so this would allow them to do all their work that way. You would have a separate post office box for those accounts. The mail would go to that separate post office box.

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR BROWN: It could be delivered to the central receiving by four o'clock in the morning. It could be processed by eight o'clock, and so that...so that all the processing work that would need to be done by the agency could be done during their regular work day. But I don't think for the demonstration that probably all the applications would be made. It could involve bar coding, which can be done by a laser printer, so that there would be an automatic recognition of whatever the form was that would even expedite the process that much more.

SPEAKER BROMM: Time.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. Okay. Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Beutler and Senator Brown. Senator Schimek.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes. Thank you, Mr. President and members. I reluctantly rise to tell you why I voted against this bill in committee. And I do have to say to Senator Brown that I think that the amendment is an improvement over the original bill.
