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SENATOR KRUSE: ...when you have 20 points. Revocation is taking the person's license away, and was done by a court. The problem with suspension is that this person will drive around with their license, show it as though they've got a license. It's not a valid license, and the officer won't know this unless they get into court records. The...number six is aggravated driving under the influence, a new offense which takes up an old one, adds it in with the same penalty for it, causing serious bodily injury, and adds the law enforcement ducking and so on that I've already referred to with my man who has cost us several million dollars in that cost. I'm going to run out of time. And I have the first amendment, so I'll complete my opening at that time.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Kruse. Senator Raikes.

SENATOR RAIKES: Thank you, Mr. Speaker and members. Senator Kruse, if you would like some additional time now to finish your presentation, I'd be happy to yield it.

SENATOR KRUSE: Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Kruse.

SENATOR KRUSE: Thank you. I...

SPEAKER BROMM: You may...wish additional time?

SENATOR KRUSE: I will yield. And I thank you, Senator Raikes and Mr. Speaker. Number seven on the sheet is final conviction. And that just clarifies that a conviction can be counted on further charges if the court has declared that the conviction is final. Number eight, vehicle confiscation, is a new item. Twenty-seven states have it. They have a forfeiture provision of some sort. They are usually much tougher than ours, such as mandatory for third offense in five years. Ours is totally at the court's discretion. It is only after the person has compiled three or more convictions, is driving with a revoked license, and is also arrested for another offense.
