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The...we have to have the treatment that goes with it. One particular part of the bill that I've had troubles with...and you would have to see it from where I see it before you would see that...and that's the interlock changes. I know that it closes a couple of loopholes, in having that ignition interlock. However, by closing them loopholes, we're going to have, I would guess, whether it be a certain percentage...and I'm just thinking of the people that I work with. Probably about ten percent of my people who now drive legally...because about half the people that I've had in the past drive whether they have suspended licenses or not, because they wouldn't get there if they didn't...that this is going to add about another ten percent to that amount, because these people aren't going to be able to use this loophole to get the ignition interlocks. So I'm will consider...seriously consider trying to amend that part out when it comes to the Select File. I'm going to listen very closely. And if I can be of any help just as a therapist in this area, I'd be more than glad to help you. But just the idea of just throwing a whole bunch more punishment on there isn't going to be the only thing. And one of the things that I know that I've always agreed with Senator Synowiecki on is, our fines for first offense DUI are way too high. Maybe we could use some of that money, or start doing...finding some different way to rechannel some of that money into more treatment. Because there's not enough counselors in the state. We've got a new program now that I was part of the committee, called the Criminal Justice Task Force on Substance Abuse. And they came up with some things that it was going to bring some consistency across the board. I'm also afraid at this time that we might have created another bureaucracy at the same time, and I'm looking into that. But at this beginning part of it, there's...that we need some consistency. But we still don't have enough counselors to even carry that on. And part of it is going to be money. We don't have treatment. In Omaha, I only have one place where I can send people to treatment that get state aid, and that's through Health and Human Services, and that's called Campus for Hope. They do very good inpatient treatment. A lot of people need inpatient treatment because it...they can't take the structure of outpatient treatment. If you have insurance, insurance will not pay, third-party will not pay...
