SENATOR MOSSEY: Because I took the refusal...

SENATOR KRUSE: We have not changed that in any way.

SENATOR MOSSEY: Okay. I took the refusal as if you refused to do implied consent then you were subject to the mandatory minimums. And that was my clarification question.

SENATOR KRUSE: Yes. Yes. Implied consent is not changed in this bill.

SENATOR MOSSEY: Okay. Thank you. And I'll yield the rest of my time to the speaker.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Mossey. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, if I told you all the things wrong about...that I see with this bill, you all would probably tell me, Ernie, I don't want you to work on anything with me. But when you undertake to do as many things as this bill is attempting to do, with the motivation behind it...and I don't mean the motivation is corrupt...it's going to be extremely difficult to get it right. I see a need here to say something about the amendment that Senator Kruse is offering, so it would be clear for the record and anybody who might be curious on the floor what we're doing. On page 8, we're talking about the habitual criminal section...or, statute. And the sentence that we're eliminating says the following: "For purposes of this section, crime means any felony or offense found through enhancement to be a felony." There are a number of difficulties with that. So rather than go through all of those...and Senator Kruse and I did discuss them...we're going to take that language out. It's a complicating factor, doesn't really achieve anything. And it has a bearing, if it would stay there, on matters other than what this bill is directed to. So that language will be removed. On page 14, the existing language in the law says what you see underlined on this page. It is simply being moved from another area of the law to this location. Since the way the bill is drafted it strikes that language from the existing statute, by us removing this language
