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SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, then let's go to another...

SENATOR KRUSE: I think 60 is pretty light for a felony.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Let's...but you're not punishing...the 60 days is not a sentence of incarceration. It's a period of time for which you cannot drive the vehicle. Would you go to page 38?

SENATOR KRUSE: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: We're talking, in line 17, about a IIIA felony which would be aggravated driving, do you agree?

SENATOR KRUSE: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And if we go to line 19, the period for which a person can be prohibited from driving would be from six months to 15 years, correct?

SENATOR KRUSE: Correct.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Why is this six months and not a year?

SENATOR KRUSE: Because this is an enhancement. This is not the basic penalty.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: What difference does that make? Here's what I'm getting at. I understand what you're saying but there's got to be some kind of rationale based on how these offenses...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...are classified. If they're felonies and they are of the same grade, and drunk driving is involved, why should a drunk who killed an unborn child, since you all made that an offense, be prohibited from driving 60 days, but if somebody killed another person, then it's for a year? And that can be a rhetorical question.
