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SENATOR KRUSE: Yes, it could be. I...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: You might want to take time to look at that.

SENATOR KRUSE: I would want to look at it again. I would not see...well, one year is...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, no. If it's...

SENATOR KRUSE: ...the minimum to my mind on a felony. But, again, this is a part of other punishments that are being meted out to this offender.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Members of the Legislature, I wanted to get that into the record by going back and forth with Senator Kruse so you would know that I'm not just saying these things are in the bill. They are actually there.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Already? Okay.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Already, sorry about that. Senator Hartnett, and as you know, it's your third time, Senator.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Mr. President, I'm going to give the rest of my time in just a little bit here to Senator Chambers. Been listen...you know, I've been listening to the discussion and so forth, and I've had some friends of mine that have been stopped and ticketed for DUI. Maybe I'm the only one in this body, but...and as I think about them and what they have done, and what has helped them is that...and I haven't looked at the bill that closely...is they've been helped by treatment rather than punishment. And I don't know whether Senator Kruse has thought of that, if you do that rather than six months in jail or something. But some friends of mine have joined triple A, Alcohol Anonymous, and that helped them. They quit drinking completely and it is because of the support group and...but maybe that's not the popular thing to do. We got to put them behind jail. And so, Senator Chambers, I would give you the rest of my time.
