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SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers, about one minute has elapsed.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. President. Thank you, Senator Hartnett. Senator Kruse, I want to ask you a question or two.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Kruse, would you respond?

SENATOR KRUSE: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And, Senator Kruse, I am asking you this question now because we've discussed this aggravated driving under the influence. How would this bill be hurt if that entire provision would be stricken, since if you do these things, they are already crimes? How would this bill be hurt? Then I have a follow-up question.

SENATOR KRUSE: The...I'm not sure what the statute says in other locations on that, Senator, so I would...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I mean the offense of aggravated driving, why do we need to create a brand new offense?

SENATOR KRUSE: Because it's about the only way we can go past fourth offense when somebody is into that category.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And when you go...

SENATOR KRUSE: That's the philosophy behind it.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...when you say go past, you mean so you can punish in a way under this that you couldn't under the existing law?

SENATOR KRUSE: Yes. It's not necessarily an increase but it's in a different way, where somebody that hasn't gotten...we have gotten their attention on fourth offense.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So the philosophy is if you are one of those who believes in whipping your children with a razor strop, and
