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down the line, if you will? Are you following...

SENATOR KRUSE: (Inaudible).

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: ...where I'm coming from here, in the sense that a person comes with a complaint, a county attorney comes with a complaint of a first offense drunk driving, and then, lo and behold, another two convictions are discovered perhaps in another state where the certified convictions, say from South Dakota, for example, came in late. Would this cause a barrier then for the county attorney to offer enhancements to third offense drunk driving?

SENATOR KRUSE: No, it would not. This is simply a printed statement of violations known to the prosecutor at that time.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: It would not impact enhancements either way?

SENATOR KRUSE: No.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Enhancements in terms of maybe enhancing down or up?

SENATOR KRUSE: Correct, it doesn't change the enhancement at all. It simply gives a report.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Does your bill, Senator, do anything with regard to the 12-year enhancement window? Does it stay at 12 years?

SENATOR KRUSE: No, it does not.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Okay, thank you. Thank you, Senator Cudaback.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Synowiecki. There are no further lights on. Senator Kruse, you're recognize to close on AM1053 to AM0571 offered by the Transportation Committee to LB 208, if you care to.
