The Accountability and Disclosure Commission was established so that the public could know from whom senators are accepting largess. The hand that feeds is the hand that controls. Now if I have colleagues who want to go to Las Vegas, they don't have to get permission from me because I'm not going to pay their way. Their way is paid by those who want to get something back from them, and it's politicians. We, of all people, know there is no such thing as a free lunch. We all know that nothing is given to us without the expectation of something in return. So if I have colleagues... I know they go traveling with ALEC, and I know big corporations and other private industries that want to get the Legislature to do things in their behalf put up the money. I know all that. The public needs to know it, and there is nothing I would do of which I'm ashamed. So if I'm not ashamed of it, why not let it be discussed openly? And we ought not keep it hid when we talk to our colleagues, I mean our constituents. We ought to tell them, yeah, there are private groups that pay for junkets for me, and I go out to Las Vegas, and it just happens that maybe there is a gambling proposition before the Legislature and I might just happen to stay at the hotel of one of the gambling outfits that
