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SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR HUDKINS: ...the State Office Building. None of that is going to change. The people that provide the security for those areas...and I've said this half a dozen times, and I'll keep saying it...the only thing that changes is who the Capitol security people report to. That's all it does.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Hudkins. Senator Cudaback.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Mr. Speaker and members, I guess this is a touchy issue. And we do have to be careful. We do have to be observant. We all know this, absolutely. And we have to pay attention, but I guess we don't want to get paranoid either. I'd like to ask Senator Hudkins a question, please, if she would respond.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Hudkins, would you yield?

SENATOR HUDKINS: Yes.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Hudkins, would this...if we did turn this over to, you might say, the State Patrol, would we still, as a body, as a senate, as an Exec Board or whatever, would we still have the ability to say, if...let's say, for instance, if the State Patrol came in and said, we want to put metal detectors in these...we want to close down all entrances but the south entrance; we want to put a detector. Would we still have the ability to say, hey, we don't think at this point in time we need this, and we want to, you know, you might say, overrule your...would we have ability to do this?

SENATOR HUDKINS: Absolutely. This would still be under the direction of the Executive Board.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Because I guess I want to go...I kind of want to go on record saying, I am not at this time for any type of a metal detector or going through these things, these wands, or whatever. I think that's becoming a little paranoid, at this time. Maybe in the future. Who knows what might happen tomorrow or the next day? But right now, and as long as we
