in control of the situation, what should we expect from them? Americans were misled into thinking that these troops, 300,000, and their steel wave of tanks and so forth, 10 miles wide and 20 miles long, would run right through Iraq and everybody would drop their guns and run. And when they didn't, the American generals started saying the Iraqis are using bizarre tactics on the battlefield. Why? Because they won't drop their guns and run, as was anticipated. There's a General Wallace, Senator Friend, and he made the admission finally, when Americans are getting their trousers pressed in Iraq...and these young people did not send themselves there. There are politicians who sent them there. He said the enemy that they war gamed against is not the enemy they're fighting. Because they let a group of racist conservatives around Bush declare what the policy of this country would be in international relations, and they told Bush to put this country at war, because not any of them or their children will be there. I'm more concerned about these young people than you are, because I do everything I could to bring them home right now. And I will not support Bush or anybody else who endangers these young people. And if any of them read any history of war, they'd see how Rommel, who was a master tactician and strategist, went through the deserts of northern Africa so fast with his Panzer division that he outran his source of supply, ran out of gas, could not engage the enemy. Well, on television, for public relations,...

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...they show these tanks skittering across the desert. And now they're so far from their source of supply, 300 miles, that they don't know whether they can get the supplies. And, Senator Friend, you know another thing they're running short on, in terms of supplies? Psychoactive drugs that the troopers need and were diagnosed to need them before they went there, but they thought they could keep them in supply. People bipolar, manic depressive, and deep depression, but they were diagnosed to the point where if they have their medication, they're all right. But they're so far away from their source of supply that they can't get these drugs to these young men. So what's going to happen to them with this additional stress? Those are the things I care about, not the surface, not these
