But I guess it goes back even further than that, my concern about 21-year-olds on campus with guns, that kind of thing. My concern even goes back to younger ages than that, and I'm thinking what do we tell our children now who have disagreements with their classmates or who see their parents carrying guns? What do we tell them about how we settle differences of opinion? How do we tell them about how they protect themselves? And I think, as a parent, if I had my...if my sons were young again, I would have a very difficult time explaining to them why people needed to carry guns to protect themselves. And I guess I really didn't give it good, thoughtful consideration before I said what I did, but I still have a concern there about young people and putting them into circumstances in which the results could be deadly, and I have a concern about our young people. I also would like to say something in response to Senator Mossey.
