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not going to change too many minds here today. But there may be a few in this group who haven't heard all of the debate who might wish to know, for instance, what some of the ramifications are going to be. And oftentimes, oftentimes it isn't even until that second round of debate that a new facet of a particular issue comes to light, and it makes us all stop and think. And I don't have any problem with debating any bill on this floor as long as it takes. And if that means eight hours or ten hours or whatever it takes on each stage of debate, I think that that's what we're here for and that's what we should be prepared for.

SPEAKER BROMM: Time.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: That...thank you, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Schimek. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, not one amendment that I offer is sillier than this bill. So I'm going to offer my amendments. And when those who are controlling the bill decide they want to move for cloture, they can do so. But it might not be too wise a thing to do. I'd like to ask Senator Tyson a question.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Tyson, would you yield, please?

SENATOR TYSON: If it's an easy question.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, it is. Senator Tyson, some people think that the Judiciary Committee amendment is as good as it can get. I want to ask you a question from page 2, if you have a copy of the amendment.

SENATOR TYSON: Bear with me just a minute, Senator, and I...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Sure I will. There's no rush. We've got plenty of time.

SENATOR TYSON: Page 2?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes. In line 2. Why...do you see it?
