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right to keep and bear arms is not absolute, and these courts have uniformly upheld the police power of the state through its Legislature to impose reasonable regulatory control over the state constitutional right to bear arms in order to promote the safety and welfare of its citizens. And now that we've had a chance to stake ourselves out philosophically on this bill, I think, because it appears that there are going to be lots and lots of floor amendments on this first section, that there may be an interest in going directly to the white copy at some time soon, which is the committee amendment. And I do want to start talking about some aspects of that. Because regardless of where you stand on this bill philosophically, the devil is always in the details, and there are a lot of details in here that we need to talk about, and how it's going to affect people in your communities trying to handle this bill. And I'll just talk about one of those areas. I know that's not part of the amendment here, but I want to raise it as one of the issues that you need to be thinking about, because we're putting into law how this is going to be handled if you support letting people carry hidden weapons. One of the issues will be for your emergency services personnel. In my community, those are pretty much volunteers. We have some professionally trained people who are hired to do that in some areas in Sarpy County. But in a lot of cases, and I'll bet it's the case in your area, that person is a volunteer who responds to a fire call or an injury call. And on page 9 of this amendment, it says, when emergency services personnel determine that the permit holder is not a threat to the safety of any person present, including emergency services personnel, and if, and here's some critical language, the permit holder is physically and mentally capable of possessing the handgun, the emergency services personnel shall return the handgun to the permit holder before releasing the permit holder from the scene and breaking contact. It further says, if the permit holder is transported for treatment, the handgun shall be turned over to any peace officer. Well, I've been asking people in my district who deal with this directly how this is going to affect their line of work. And here, I'd just like to read part of what I got back in an e-mail today, saying, I hope it's not too late, but here are some thoughts. The sections that address emergency service personnel puts fire and EMS personnel at undue risk and requires them to determine,
