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isn't. Another question that I have is, I've been getting e-mails and calls. I've got people on both sides of the story. But one of the questions that I have is, is the sheriff going to be opening himself up to any liability if he's in the permitting process?

SENATOR TYSON: Not at all, Senator Stuthman. The...take me just about a half a minute here. That is specifically provided in this, on page 7, Section 9, lines 26 and 27, and then over to page 8. No sheriff who issues a permit under the Concealed Handgun Permit Act is civilly liable to any injured person or his or her estate for any injury suffered, including any action for wrongful death or property damage suffered, relating to the issuance or revocation of the permit. Now, that has been in every portion of the bill. That was not added into this committee amendment. That was an objection raised by several sheriffs, including mine, about this bill several years ago. And it was taken care of in that fashion. I've been told that they consider that to be adequate.

SENATOR STUTHMAN: So in other words, it is your interpretation that the sheriff should be not worried or concerned one bit if this bill is passed.

SENATOR TYSON: Not for a New York second, Senator Stuthman. This exempts him. He is acting...I'm not going to say in a clerical sense, because he's not. He still has the judgment to perform, and I'm sure that they will, because they're conscientious people. But as far...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR TYSON: ...the law specific says that he is not liable for this.

SENATOR STUTHMAN: I thank you for those comments, because that does clear it up a little bit more for me. And I...hopefully it clears it up for some of the sheriffs that are listening at this time, because I know there are several of them that are very much concerned about it. But what is your...I'm still not totally clear on as far as the fiscal impact that it's going to
