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SENATOR TYSON: I believe that it is.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: But I don't know how to judge where it is now. And as I look at this fiscal note, it is rather pricey, the way it's written.

SENATOR TYSON: And I do not...let me put it...I'm sorry for interrupting you.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: That's okay.

SENATOR TYSON: There is one item in there, and I don't have it right in front of me, but they had something like...well, here, yeah, I do have it. The cost for DMV, this would be on page 1, I guess, is \$53,351?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Well, \$54,351, yes, for designing new digital license.

SENATOR TYSON: Fifty-three thousand three hundred and fifty-one dollars. For a few lines of code? I don't think so. We hired programmers when I was working for a living, and it didn't...I just think that that's...I think it's a chance...as I've noticed in the Chamber before, I think they seize the opportunity of putting up numbers that really have no basis in fact.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: No. (Laugh)

SENATOR TYSON: I know, you're shocked.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Well, the point is, Senator Tyson...and I accept what you just said about that particular aspect. The point is that it...the fiscal note suggests that we'll have to come up with over half a million dollars in the first year. I'm just wanting to hear from you that we're not going to have a big fiscal note on this bill. And I'm going to want to hear from you why we're not going to have a big fiscal note. Now, you've mentioned one small item. But there are some bigger items here, like, the State Patrol has background checks, \$624,000 the first year.
