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SENATOR TYSON: They have to start with something.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes.

SENATOR TYSON: I believe that the cost is less than \$100. As I mentioned before, and I think it was when I was talking with Senator Stuthman, one state...several states, I believe have \$10. The state of Texas has like a hundred and forty-some dollars. I don't know what the other states are.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time. Thank you, Senator Schimek. Senator Tyson, followed by Senator Chambers.

SENATOR TYSON: Senator Schimek, let me finish out on this, so that...because I want you to have your answer. I believe that when you take these numbers that are based on estimates...and that's just a kinder, gentler word than "guess"...that you come up with these things. And then I don't see anything in the revenue column. And if my estimate of 30,000 at \$1...at \$100, that's \$3 million. So they come up with 600, but they come up with no revenue, offsetting revenue. And that, I believe, is the fallacy in that fiscal note.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator...

SENATOR TYSON: DiAnna, are you...?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: I...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Schimek, do you...?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...I just wanted to respond, that I suspect that at least part of what you say is right. And I guess we won't know anything unless this bill gets over to Select, and we then get a new fiscal note. But lots of fiscal notes have to be based on guesstimates.

SENATOR TYSON: Oh, most of them.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: I mean, there's no way to know for sure.
