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SENATOR TYSON: Say this again, please, Senator Burling?

SENATOR BURLING: Does the sheriff...when I go in for a...to apply for a concealed carry,...

SENATOR TYSON: Yes.

SENATOR BURLING: ...does the sheriff take my word for the qualifications, or does he have a database to check it out?

SENATOR TYSON: He has the means to check out everything on here. We did have to make one change. Because originally the green copy said a ten-year check of mental illness, et cetera, and we were informed by Health and Human Services that their records ran five years. But he can access that. He can access your criminal record. The purpose of the fingerprints is to do an NCIC and a local state check. And the rest of it, I would think, and you can go over it item by item if you'd like, Senator Burling, that he can independently verify,...

SENATOR BURLING: Okay.

SENATOR TYSON: ...as to your address, your age, et cetera.

SENATOR BURLING: Okay. Now, if I receive this permit to carry, do I have another card for my billfold, or is there some indication on my driver's license that I have this permit?

SENATOR TYSON: No, you have another card in your billfold. We originally had it, Senator Burling, that the...your driver's license would be marked. That was removed at the behest of DMV. And they pointed out that your card may not expire with your driver's license, or it may expire prematurely. And there would always be that gap, as far as their issuing a true and correct copy of a new driver's license. So it will be on a Motor Vehicles database, so that if you're ever stopped by a Patrol officer of a county sheriff, whoever, and he runs a check on your tag, it will come in back with your name, identifying the automobile, and it will tell him that you have a concealed carry permit. At that point, when he approaches the car, having that information, you have the obligation, under this act, to inform
