SENATOR TYSON: Well, at 10 inches, no. There is some lugar flattops that are 10 inches. I would say eight and three-eighths is the commonest long barrel.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And if somebody used one of those weapons to unclog a sink drain, they could call it a Roto-Rooter.

SENATOR TYSON: Hmm, here it again it depends. We had some testimony from an expert, Senator Mines, here on a .50 Desert Eagle. I don't know of any single person, I do not know one that even carries it in other than a case.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, here is the question now I will ask you.

SENATOR TYSON: So do you want to put a weight restriction in there, too?
