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if in fact we would end up with a situation where the unelected officials who really, in a sense, don't have the authority to spend dollars for the county, for the state, or anybody else, would all of a sudden be in the majority and be able to take charge. And I guess I just want to cast that little bit of warning that I think we ought to somehow address that issue before this bill...it isn't necessarily right now, but somewhere I think we ought to take into account that in fact the people who have the direct authority to spend money for the counties, the state, or whoever, are somehow made in charge, at least of that part of it. I don't know how you would word it. I suspect an amendment could be put up that would disallow those other people from voting on issues of financial matters. But I don't want to be the one to do that. But I think...I just wanted to make you aware of it. And I think that you appear by...you indicated that you agree with that, and would probably try to work in that direction. Is that...am I assuming that's right?

SENATOR JENSEN: I certainly do. Like I said, it's paramount that we allow those people who are elected by the citizens to make those financial decisions.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Well, and there is there a possibility that some amendments will be coming along, or...on Select, or...?

SENATOR JENSEN: We'll certainly consider that, and we'll be glad to work with you and...on that. I don't want to get real specific until we've met with as many stakeholders as we can.

SENATOR VRTISKA: I understand that. And I'm certainly not...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR VRTISKA: ...I want it very clear that I'm not trying to slow this bill down or do anything to damage the bill. I just thought the issue was paramount that we ought to at least talk about it. And if there's a way we can resolve the issue and still protect the...basically the taxpayer, I'm willing to work with you or anybody else to do that. And we can talk about it later. With that, I appreciate your time. Thank you very much.
