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year, so I...

SENATOR BEUTLER: Oh, okay. I shouldn't be asking you. Thank you very much. Senator Bromm, let me ask you, if I might.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Bromm, would you respond to a question from Senator Beutler?

SPEAKER BROMM: Yes.

SENATOR BEUTLER: I know from the way you do things that this piece ultimately is your work, in the sense that I have no doubt but that you...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...that you controlled it. But the group of people that you gathered together to deal with this problem, who represented the workers in that group?

SPEAKER BROMM: Well, I would say that we had several members of the committee who are always concerned about workers. We did not have any worker per se that would be considered strictly an employee involved. Although I...you know, I don't think that some of the groups that had input would necessarily be considered totally representing employers. The workers' compensation court actually had an awful lot of input last year, and also again this summer. And in our discussions with them,...I don't want to...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time. Thank you, Senator Beutler Senator Louden.

SENATOR LOUDEN: Thank you, Mr. President and members of the body. This workmen's compensation, from my observation and what I've used it myself for in our business, it isn't always the best insurance there is out there. We can probably buy a health insurance and buy a life insurance for an employee when we just have a few employees, way cheaper than what it costs you to get into the pool on workmen's compensation. The more amendments you put on this thing and the more you make it more restrictive,
