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Medicare. The price of that protection then doesn't fall on the industry or on the particular employer; it falls upon the taxpayer generally. And I think that that is another part of the...of what makes government bigger than it should be. Because once again, government is entering into the process and being the protector because we've determined societally that these people should be protected and that they should be...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...taken care of when they're injured.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Beutler and Senator Preister. Senator Beutler, there are no further lights on, senators wishing to speak. You're recognized to close on your amendment if you care to.

SENATOR BEUTLER: So the taxpayer...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Are you closing, Senator Beutler?

SENATOR BEUTLER: I am closing, Senator.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Okay. Thank you. Thank you, Senator.

SENATOR BEUTLER: So the tax...I don't have any more speaking time, do I?

SENATOR CUDABACK: You're correct. You got me.

SENATOR BEUTLER: So I must be closing.

SENATOR CUDABACK: You're right.

SENATOR BEUTLER: All right. The taxpayer...if you're going to charge the taxpayer, which is what you're doing, then maybe it makes sense to address the problem up front in a preventative sense and simply put the General Funds in so that insurance coverage can be provided. Thirdly, the point of the law was to protect the business person. Now, the business person is protected because the business person is not going to be
