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definition again because eventually I want to try to get to how this works all together.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Time, Senator Beutler. Your light is next, Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Bromm, thank you for bearing with me, but it is a complicated definition, I think you would agree. "Six or more unrelated, full-time employees, whether in one or more locations, on each working day during any thirteen-week period, whether or not such weeks are consecutive." So do they all have to be working, Senator, at the same time? That is, do all six of them have to be working at the same time, like on April or December...on June 30, if I have six workers who are unrelated and full-time?

SPEAKER BROMM: The intent, Senator Beutler, and what was discussed when the language was inserted with the committee was that, no, that does not mean they have to be working at the same time. You look at the entire calendar year and if you have six or more unrelated full-time employees who work during any...at different times during any 13-week period, and it doesn't have to be consecutive weeks, then you come under the act. So I might work four weeks in the spring, I might work four weeks at some point in the summer and five weeks in the fall, and generally work at least five days out of a week and I would be considered one of those six employees.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. But upon any week I work just four days, that week doesn't count. Would that be right?

SPEAKER BROMM: I'm going to need to maybe talk with committee counsel a little bit so I don't misstate the record here, but I think what the committee's and my intent is, that if you work...if you work those four days and then you continue at a different time and you work a number of days again, you accumulate those days and then you cumulative have a 13-week period where you have six or more people, not necessarily at the same time, you're going to be under the act.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. So if one person works 65 days during a
