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have to decide what is in the best interest of the public, and we have to go forward with that. We can't judge this all on our own personal views. And I think that that transcends beyond what we're supposed to be doing. We're not elected to represent and to express our own personal likes or dislikes. We're here to represent the state of Nebraska. We are senators from a particular district. But we are senators for the state of Nebraska, and it's our responsibility to put forth to the public what is the best quality of legislation that we can for them to vote on. I'm very much in favor of what Senator Bromm has proposed, and that is that we limit the number. I never thought that eight was a wieldy number in the state of Nebraska. We're a big state with very little population. And a determination as to whether or not a casino is going to be put in a location in Nebraska is going to be based upon the economics of the situation, not upon location, not upon desire and all that. It's going to be driven by the marketplace. And the marketplace is going to be judged by where there is an adequate population base and in economic strata where it would make it viable to have that kind of a facility. So I think that I will...Senator Erdman, I had a question for you, if you would yield, please.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Erdman, would you yield to a question from Senator Pederson?

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: Senator Erdman,...

SENATOR ERDMAN: It would be my honor.

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: ...I thought when you spoke that I heard you say something about a crazy constitutional provision. What were you talking about?

SENATOR ERDMAN: I believe what I was talking about was the conglomerate that this bill is becoming, and the language that would be placed in our constitution. I believe that was my comment. If that's not true, you can correct me. But I think that's where I was headed. And if that's not right,...

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: Well, I certainly wouldn't be a judge as to what you were thinking at the time. So I'll accept what you
