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is the control that we have. The Legislature will have some control over these casinos. One thing that's not mentioned in the numbers, of course, we still have the Native Americans, how many they're going to have, we don't know. So there will be additional casinos in Nebraska. And like Senator Jensen said, this is not going to assist our budget problems as has been proven in other states. And like, and it's like I mentioned before, for every dollar you take in, there is two dollars go out, a dollar in social costs and a dollar in economic costs because people are spending that money for things other...I mean they are spending money on gambling that they would be purchasing other items with. I got a note from a lady that...a former Iowan, who moved in not too long ago from Iowa, and she attested to the fact that gambling casinos have not helped with taxes. The property taxes have raised almost every year. In addition, they're having the same budget problems that we're having. So as far as the help of the money that you bring in and, sure, it shows. I think something Senator Schimek passed out here as far as our neighboring state, Iowa, gross gaming revenue, \$922 million; the tax revenue, \$216 million, tax revenue. But of those tax revenues, how much did we lose in other taxes we would have...in other sales taxes and such that we would have gotten if they would...if that money were spent on other items, and how much less would we have spent on social costs? So as far as the...but I do like the control part of this. I do like the limited number part of it, but that's about it. And, again, I will not support the final bill if it gets on the ballot. We should try to make it as...if it does get it out of here and gets on the ballot, then I think we should make it as good as we can possibly make it through the legislative process. But I will not support the final bill. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Engel. (Visitor introduced.) On with discussion, Senator Maxwell.

SENATOR MAXWELL: Thank you, Mr. President. I rise to address the overall legislation, the resolution, not the amendment. I do so because of the way these debates work. You're never quite sure when your opportunity might be to speak, and I anticipate this will be my only time speaking.
